The Rocky Boy Veterans Center was established on June 24, 2015. Prior to the existence of the Rocky Boy Veterans Center, the Rocky Boy's American Legion Post 67 was the sole Veterans organization in Rocky Boy. In January 2016, RBVC has submitted required documentation for recognition as a Non-Profit Organization, and has been approved, dated August 24, 2015. The RBVC operates with four staff members, in which two are paid employees and two are volunteer staff. The mission of the RBVC, "Veterans helping Veterans for a better future" is the basis for all action in serving and honoring Rocky Boy Veterans and Service Members. The RBVC and American Legion Post 67 maintain the vision of, "The Rocky Boy Veterans Center will become the hub for Veterans, Service Members and their families to receive all benefits they have earned in their service to the Chippewa-Cree people and our country". The Rocky Boy Veterans Center board consists of seven (7) board members, in which five (5) are military Veterans. The board brings to the center a variety of backgrounds and expertise when moving the organization forward.


Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation enrollment is at or around 6844 Chippewa-Cree tribal members. Of the 6844 tribal members, 330 are military Veterans (Rocky Boy's Veterans Business Outreach Center assessment, 2011). Of the 330 military Veterans, 176 Veterans currently reside on Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation. The Veteran population consists of Veterans serving during Peacetime, Korean Conflict Era to Operation Enduring Freedom/Operation Iraqi Freedom Era and Service members who continue to serve the Nation today. Nearly 36% (64/176) Veterans have been identified as needing services that range from referral to case management.

The geographic region served is Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation and surrounding areas, to include Havre, Big Sandy, Chinook and Fort Belknap Indian Reservation. More intense services are targeted toward Veterans residing on the Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation. The Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation is geographically isolated from urban areas and is highly rural. The Rocky Boy's Agency is located 30 miles south of Havre, MT. (population 9,792, US Census Bureau, 2014). There are no urban areas south or east of the reservation. 110 miles to the west and south, is Great Falls, MT. (population 59,152, US Census Bureau, 2014).

The types of service provided at this time by the Rocky Boy Veterans Center consist of minimal case management, referral to tribal, state and federal service providers located both on and off the reservation; transportation to VA clinics or VA referred medical appointments, cultural support, minimal supportive direct services (lights, propane, and/or food) and accessing military records.

The annual operating budget in 2015 was \$74,857.00. The budget expenses consisted of \$24,857.00 for utilities and maintenance for the building that program and staff are housed,

minimal direct and supportive services for area Veterans, and maintenance of program vehicle. This amount includes the salary of one staff member and the director. This budget also includes The Highly Rural Transportation Grant, a \$50,000 Federal grant, which provided for one vehicle and one paid driver to transport Veterans to VA medical appointments or VA referred medical appointments.

The Rocky Boy Veterans Center's five (5) year plan consists of projects, beginning with "2016, Strengthen the Warrior" project. This year's project includes expansion of the center with regard to staff. Part of the plan is written for training and development of professional services to be provided by the staff to our Veteran population. Additionally, plans include providing information to the Veteran population from tribal, state and federal service providers through conferences and/or workshops. The "2016, Strengthen the Warrior" project is the foundation of future projects, in which each builds on the other.

The decision to mount the "2016, Strengthen the Warrior" project and continuing projects was planned and based on an assessment conducted with the Veteran Community in 2011. The factors that contribute to this decision included continued assessment of needs for the area Veteran population and evaluation of the services provided. The opportunity for the development of a Veterans Center came at a time when concerned Veterans compiled data from the assessment in 2011 and identified a variety of needs at that time, specific to Korean Conflict Era Veterans to OEF/OIF Era Veterans, in which those same needs for the Veteran require addressing today.

The expansion of the existing Rocky Boy Veterans Center and services rendered by the staff is of utmost importance to the Rocky Boy Veterans Center Board, RBVC staff and volunteers, the Rocky Boy Community and especially to the Veteran population in the area. The high level of commitment of the staff and board originates from challenges and successes of personnel experiences from Veterans to assist other Veterans to move forward using benefits earned as a stepping stone, one of many, on a path toward stability and better quality of life. The nature of the commitment has been created from military experiences and American Indian traditional and cultural background from the staff and board.

The RBVC has a diverse population of Veterans in the service area which range from tribally enrolled to non-enrolled and non-native veterans, disabled, male and female and young and elderly Veterans. The Rocky Boy Veterans Center is pursuant to providing services and support to a Veteran population in which we believe is highly underserved on this reservation and in this local area; the Veterans we intend to and currently serve struggle to provide a stable quality of life for themselves and family in which our mission is to provide information and support to help them to make informed decisions, and provide preventative efforts that address the physical, spiritual, social and psychological needs culturally appropriate to the Veteran.

Vietnam Era

- •37.8% of 94,404 Veterans in Montana served during Vietnam Era*

INFORMATION & REFFERAL

The current staff of the RBVC consists of the Director and 4 volunteers from the American Legion Post 67. The RBVC currently provides information dissemination to all Veterans, as well as case referrals to Service Providers within the area.

DIRECT SERVICES

The RBVC provides limited direct services to Veterans facing economic hardships in the form of direct payments to area vendors for electricity, propane, food, fuel, comfort items, etc.

TRANSPORTATION (via The American Legion Post 67):

The RBVC provides transportation services to Veterans living on the Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation and in Hill County to VA medical/VA referred medical appointments.

OBJECTIVES

The following goals have been identified for the project; these goals will move the RBVC forward while building the foundation for the following year's project.

- GOAL 1: Introduce and integrate a culturally appropriate support system
- GOAL 2: Provide information and education to access VA benefits
- GOAL 3: Expand current intensive case management services
- GOAL 4: Increase overall support resources
- GOAL 5: Increase training and collaboration for the RBVC staff

Primary objective for 2016: is that the RBVC will provide the necessary resources to Rocky Boy Veterans, so they can make informed decisions to provide a stable quality of life for themselves and their families.
